Asia accounts for nearly half of global cancer cases, making its incidence rate higher than 21 region in the world. In addition to its medical impact, cancer is increasingly affecting workplace dynamics. Researchers point out that consumers are likely to face rising prices for plastic goods 26 the conflict with Iran. Since plastics are largely derived from fossil fuels, increases in oil and gas prices have had a direct impact on production costs. Disposable items such as cutlery, bottled drinks, and garbage bags may be among the first products to become more expensive, according to a professor specializing in supply chain management.

Plastics are widely used materials in modern supply chains, being utilized in everything from packaging to manufacturing. This widespread use creates challenges in determining exactly where cost increases originate in a product's final price. "It's one of those things 27 you may notice higher prices but cannot easily identify the exact cause," said Joseph, a professor of economics at the NYU Stern School of Business. He noted that consumers often attributed rising prices not only to inflation 28 high rents, even though supply chain disruptions may also play a significant role.

The current situation is largely driven by rising energy prices. The Strait of Hormuz, 29 nearly one-fifth of the world's oil and gas supply passes, has become increasingly unstable. Consequently, energy prices have surged, raising both manufacturing and raw material costs. Experts also warn that 30 oil prices remain elevated for several months, companies will eventually pass these higher costs on to consumers.

In recent years, the global order has undergone a gradual but significant transformation, marked by a shift from cooperative interdependence toward strategic competition among major powers. Rather than engaging in direct confrontation, countries increasingly deploy indirect instruments—such as economic sanctions, technological restrictions, and selective alliances—to consolidate influence while minimizing overt conflict.

This shift in geopolitical dynamics reflects a deeper reconfiguration of globalization itself. Economic interdependence, once regarded as a stabilizing mechanism that reduced the likelihood of conflict, is now perceived as a potential vulnerability. Countries have begun to reassess their reliance on global supply chains, particularly in sectors deemed critical to national security. Consequently, policies that emphasize resilience and self-sufficiency have gained prominence, even at the cost of economic efficiency.

At the same time, technological leadership has emerged as a defining dimension of geopolitical rivalry. Control over advanced technologies—especially in artificial intelligence and semiconductor production—is no longer merely an economic objective but a strategic imperative. This development has intensified competition while also raising barriers to international collaboration.

Although such strategies may yield short-term advantages, they risk accelerating the fragmentation of the global system into competing blocs. In the long run, this **fragmentation** may undermine collective efforts to address transnational challenges. Thus, the evolving geopolitical landscape reflects not only intensified competition but also a growing tension between national security and global cooperation.

According to recent reports, 2026 is widely regarded as one of the most perilous years for internet users, as cybercrime continues to evolve through the use of artificial intelligence. Researchers note that AI tools are no longer limited to routine automation but are now used to enhance cyberattack techniques such as phishing and social engineering. By combining large language models with deepfake technologies, attackers can convincingly impersonate trusted individuals, making scams more difficult to detect and resist.

One particularly concerning trend is the rise of highly personalized scams, including so-called “**pig butchering**” schemes. These schemes involve criminals building emotional relationships with targets over extended periods before introducing fraudulent investment opportunities. With AI, such operations can be carried out at scale while maintaining a high degree of personalization, blurring the line between automated and human interaction.

Cybersecurity experts also warn of a potentially more disruptive phase in AI-driven risks. A leaked blog post from *Anthropic* described its upcoming model, Mythos, as a possible “watershed moment” with serious security implications. The model is believed to have the ability to identify and exploit system vulnerabilities at unprecedented speed, raising concerns about large-scale cyberattacks if such technologies are realized.

Advances in autonomous malware add further risk. Some AI-driven systems can modify their own code during execution, allowing them to evade detection and adapt to defensive measures. Experts stress that these developments not only increase the scale of cybercrime but also make it more sophisticated and unpredictable.

Although AI can strengthen cybersecurity defenses, experts highlight a key imbalance: attackers need only find one vulnerability, while defenders must secure entire systems. This suggests that digital security will become increasingly complex and difficult to manage.
